Full Speed Ahead: Using Infrastructure Corridors, ExpressLanes and CEQA Modernization to Get Projects Done

A 21st century transportation system requires 21st century planning. Southern California is using innovation to bring projects online for taxpayers as efficiently and cost-effectively as possible. New tools in the toolbox include the use of infrastructure corridors that collocate transportation modes and energy transmission to minimize the amount of right-of-way needed for large-scale projects. ExpressLanes are not new to Southern California, but a comprehensive ExpressLanes system could be a game-changer for commuters and spur increased transit investment as well. California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) modernization is an essential component of bringing projects to market and attracting private capital, while ensuring that projects both minimally impact our environment and enhance the communities they serve.
